Quota impact greater on inshore (2010-2015)

SFA 4

▶ Increase to the offshore sector (8,908 t to 10,394 t; 17%) and the inshore sector (537 t to 677 t; 31%)

SFA 5

▶ No change in quota; decline in 2014, reversed in 2015

SFA 6

- ► Offshore decline from 13,928 t to 13,559 t and inshore decline from 35,459 t to 31,637 t
- ► Effect on inshore compounded by the quota share increase to 41,293 t for 2012 and 2013



Science is telling...

- Significant biomass decline in SFA 4 (42% from 2014 to 2015
- ► Slight increase in biomass in SFA 5 (3 % from 2014 to 2015)
- ► Significant biomass decline in SFA 6 (41 % from 2014 to 2015)



Serious concern about the effects of the LIFO policy

- Not presenting data per se; numerous reports for the panel to consider and analyze
- ► Conducted interviews with over 30 small business owners in Old Perlican, Port-au-Choix, Fogo Island, Twillingate, Lewisporte and St. Anthony.
- ▶ Members stated if no changes to the LIFO policy, the effects would be drastic and their communities would be devastated.



Inshore has huge economic effect

- ▶ There are substantial spin-offs in the region
 - Groceries and other supplies are purchased locally
 - Boat and fish plant repairs and maintenance done locally
 - Product has to be trucked
 - Inshore fish harvesters and plant workers spend money in their communities
 - Without adequate work in the fish plant, difficult to qualify for EI for the winter



Recommendation

- ► Abolish the LIFO policy
 - ► Leave total SFA 6 quota for the inshore sector and let offshore sector have more in SFA 5
- ▶ Begin to seriously plan a transition for inshore harvesters from shellfish to groundfish
