Our Views

- We support the concept of marine protection and standards.
- > They must reflect our sovereignty, rights and title.
- They must benefit future access and utilization by members.
- They must prioritise areas of vulnerable and sensitive cultural features, as well as ecologically significant areas.

What Shapes Our Views

- Shaped by rights, title and sovereignty.
- Shaped by extensive experience in BC land/coastal plans, federal PNCIMA plan, and MaPP marine planning.
- Shaped by Member Nation marine plans and codevelopment of MaPP plan for North Vancouver Island.
- > Shaped by identification of areas for special protection management & related standards in these plans.



Views on IUCN Tools

- ➤ IUCN Categories used to characterize our NVI Plan protection management areas for comparison purposes.
- ➤ IUCN standards for allowable uses, activities considered as a starting point or general check for management.
- ➤ IUCN categories and standards not needed as a starting point in our territories our marine plans are our starting point, as they outline acceptable uses everywhere.
- ➤ IUCN standards are single-area focused, do not represent an integrated, ecosystem approach to marine management and planning.

Role of Indigenous Approaches

- ➤ A much greater need for consideration of indigenous approaches is required- not only standards but other aspects of management and planning.
- A greater need to consider protection standards in the broader context of rights, title, stewardship roles of First Nations.
- A greater need to consider standards in the context of inter-connectedness, and integrated management of the broader territory.
